



Who are the next **GENERATIONS** of Christians?

enerally speaking, in the 1980s/90s, Christians were firmly committed to doctrinal integrity, moral values, and a lifestyle that distinguished them from the world. Church teachings were sacred, the line between right and wrong was sharply drawn, and there was an overwhelming awareness that being a Christian meant living according to Bible standards.

Fast forward to modern days, there is a significant shift. The standards that once defined Christian life have been greatly diluted, evoking a sense of loss and raising profound concerns about present-day believers' long-term influence and eventual destiny.

The Early 90s was a time of clear standards. Most Christians adhered tenaciously to the teachings of Scripture. Sermons centered mostly on the need for personal holiness, spiritual discipline, and a lifestyle that reflected the teachings of Jesus. Believers accepted the Bible as the authoritative word of God, with final authority on matters of faith and conduct. Its teachings were the guiding principle for personal conduct and communal life.

Churches were not bothered by any so-called political correctness, as they were unequivocal on moral issues such as marriage and sexual orientation. There was no argument whether divorce and remarriage while one's spouse is still alive or abortion was right or wrong. The sanctities of marriage and life were not debatable. All social issues were weighed on the scales of "what says the Scripture?", and there was little or no ambiguity about what was considered right and wrong. This clarity provided Christians with a strong sense of identity and a clear witness to the wider society.

Unfortunately, today, there is a massive shifting of standards. The ancient landmarks of the faith, which the fathers set, have been moved. Today, the Christian landscape is characterised by rampant materialism and shocking disregard for Biblical laws on topics like tithing, restitution, love, and honour for the elderly.

Several factors have contributed to this shift in standards. They include cultural pressures, modernism, the rise of secularism, and a desire for greater inclusivity. While some of these changes have been beneficial in making the church more accessible to a broader audience, they have also lowered the moral and doctrinal standards that once defined the faith.

One of the appalling changes is the growing acceptance of behaviours and lifestyles that were once considered incompatible with Christian teaching. Issues such as cohabitation before marriage, divorce, and same-sex relationships are now often approached with a level of tolerance that would have been unthinkable in the 80s or early 90s. In an effort to be more welcoming, many Christian assemblies have softened their stance on these issues, definitely at the expense of Biblical principles. In many circles, ecclesiastical authority and privileges are now bestowed on gays and lesbians.

Additionally, the authority of Scripture has been increasingly questioned or reinterpreted to fit modern sensibilities. The once clear lines of Christian doctrine have become blurred as more believers and leaders prioritise personal experience, material acquisition, and cultural relevance over traditional teachings. This has led to a more subjective approach to faith, where individual beliefs and preferences often precede established doctrine.

This lowering of standards has had negative implications for the church's witness. When Christians adopt standards that are indistinguishable from those of the surrounding culture, their ability to offer a compelling alternative diminishes. As the Bible says, the salt has lost its savour, or the axe head has become blunt or entirely fallen off its handle. The distinctiveness of the Christian life—a life of sacrifice, holiness, devotion, and obedience to God—becomes obscured, and with it, the church's power to influence and transform society.

Furthermore, as the lines between Christian and secular ethics blur, the church risks losing its moral authority. If the church is seen as merely echoing the prevailing cultural norms rather than offering a counter-cultural message grounded in timeless truths, its relevance and credibility are undermined.

But like the Psalmist, we are tempted to ask a pertinent question in all of these; "If the foundation be destroyed, what shall the righteous do?" The question that arises from this reflection is whether the church can or should return to the higher standards that once characterised its life and witness. Of course, this does not mean a return to archaic religion, legalism or an unyielding rigidity, but rather a recommitment to the core principles of the faith—a re-embracing of the call to holiness, the authority of Scripture, and the distinctiveness of the Christian life.

Such a renewal will require courageous leadership, a clear articulation of Christian doctrine, and a willingness among believers to live counter-culturally. It's a call to action, a reminder that change is possible and necessary. It may also involve difficult decisions, such as standing firm on controversial issues or challenging popular but unbiblical trends within the church.

In conclusion, while the Christian church has always had to navigate the tension between remaining faithful to its beliefs and engaging with a changing world, lowering standards today represents a significant departure from the faith practised in the early 80/90s.

To reclaim its witness, the church must find a way to balance cultural engagement with a steadfast commitment to the truths that have sustained it for millennia. This balance is crucial, as it ensures the church offers the world not just another version of itself, but a transformative vision of life as it was meant to be lived.

Ashamed, Unworthy, Broken, Shaken, Depressed, Messed up, Shattered, Addicted, Miserable and Unforgiving!

e've all been there at some point in our lives, trapped in the darkness of our own making, wondering if there's a way out; but, reading through the scriptures, we see the story of God's redeeming Grace.

The Bible, and the world at large is punctuated by a plethora of stories and testimonies of individuals who started off on the wrong foot, later found their right footing in God after having embraced the salvific work of grace. Different in its beginning, these stories all have the same happy ending when they let Christ into their lives.

Rahab, known for harlotry within the walls of Jericho, changed the course and trajectory of her life by accommodating and hiding the spies from Israel. Her belief in the God of Israel brought her freedom from the wages of sin and thus became part of the genealogy of Christ.

The Bible says in verse 8 of the same chapter-"These be the names of the mighty men whom David had..." We see the beauty of grace and its ability to transform our mess into a message of hope and redemption through Christ. What a strange and marvelous God!

These stories are the experiences of many today; those who have struggled with the guilt of abortion, the grip of addiction, the shame of hypocrisy, the guilt of unforgiveness, and many more. But it's in these darkest moments that God's redeeming grace shines brightest.

When you consider the trial Joseph faced from his brothers and the temptation in Potiphar's household or you consider the temptation of Daniel who chose not to give in to the pressure of the evil decree that was signed by the king, or the confrontation endured by Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego when they refused to bow down to the idols of King Nebuchadnez-

If you're struggling to find your way out of a mess, know that you're not alone. And more importantly, know that God is not done with you yet; He is just getting started.

One of the beautiful aspects of God's character is His ability to restore what has been shattered, broken, and messy. Whether it's a shattered dream, a broken relationship, or a life marred by regret, God can take those pieces and create something new and beautiful. This is the power of restoration, taking what's been broken and making it whole again. And it's a power that's available to each of us, no matter what our past may hold.

But restoration isn't always easy. Often, it requires us to face our temptations head on and overcome them. That informed the idea behind the name, Jay-mikee? Was there a day when the pieces of your life started coming together letting you know there was so much to your life as a child born into a popular Christian family?

Okay... That's a good question.

So, the name JAY MIKEE started in 2015 after my NYSC, When I wanted to open an account. Funny enough, it was a very funny concept. It was not a mystical idea, rather, because I wanted to open an account on one of the music streaming platforms, I think reverbnation.com and the name JAY MIKE J-A-Y-M-I-K-E was taken. I did not want to use the full name. Joshua Mike Bamiloye, as I felt it was too long. At that point, I felt JAY MIKE sounded good enough, but it was taken, so I just added an extra suffix "e" to it, and that was how I realised it was available. Hence, the name JAY MIKEE.

So, the thing is, it was not a day that everything in my life just came together and became organised. It was a process, which was over time. Therefore, the idea of my identity, which of course I knew right from my school days, but the precise nature of what I was going to do exactly began to take shape after school. After NYSC, that was when I knew that, yes!, this is what I was going to do full time and it keeps manifesting, even, till today.

ow can you describe your early Christian life as a creative with the challenge(s) you faced then? And how has submitting to the will of God helped you on your journey as it relates to purpose fulfillment?

This question is in three parts, but let me try and break it down.

How do I describe my early christian life as a creative?

Describing my early christian life as a creative. Well..., the best answer I can give to that is by linking it to the second question which is submitting it to the will of God.

The thing about career path(s) and and what we are meant to do is understanding that God has our blueprint and our lives. The truth of the matter is that you can't go wrong serving God, doing God's will, abiding in the will of God.

The fact is that you know that you can't go wrong being led by the spirit of God and by the fear of God and that is the kind of what has helped me all this while knowing fully well that everything I am doing is to the glory of God.

Some people feel there is a mysterious way we are meant to discover what we are to do in life. What we are meant to do in life will not follow the narrative that everyone has to see the burning bush that did not get burnt and hear the voice of God.

However, one thing is that we can never go wrong when we use our interests, passion and skillset to the glory of God. When we do that, God begins to refine that position, the direction into what aligns with his will. But in all, we can not go wrong through that path. Therefore, as a creative, you know, I could not have imagined living a life outside the christian faith as a creative, as it would have been a very confusing one.

When I submitted to God, He helped me to distinguish between what is my primary gift, my secondary gift, most important, most preeminence, and meant to be, by the way, "side work",

so to speak.

BALANCE is something most creatives struggle with. How do you navigate life as a husband, father, musician, actor, and versatile creative, yet maintaining a great relationship with God?

BALANCE, to be honest is not something I have fully figured out. I am still trying to figure it out. For instance, if I had just one job and from that, I go home to my family after closing from the job, to me it would have been much better and straightforward.

But, peculiar to me, there are several things that I am into and I feel all those things have their variations of importance. As at now, I am still trying to figure out how to actually create that expected BALANCE. But, so far, what I have



learned in all is, as a creative, try not to engage in everything synchronously. What do I mean?

First of all, prioritise your list based on what is fundamental or primary, secondary, and lastly, supporting the rest financially. When you're able to distinguish from the list, it helps you to prioritise, so that you can know the alloted duration for each. By the time you split it that way, you can easily put your mind at peace and go about your activities without any obstruction.

However, you might not give yourself a hundred percent in everything, but it gives you a more satisfactory outcome than tackling them as they appear either by feelings or intuition, as it might lead to living a very confusing life. As an individual, God has really given me the grace to be able to separate sufficient time for my family and ministry. Meanwhile, I am still working on it, but I can say I am in a better place than I was few years ago, when I just got married.

What advice would you give to creatives who have multiple creative abilities and need clarification on which to focus on or manage, when they see how someone like you combine everything? Or your advice generally to creatives at different levels?

So, yeah, it's the same thing I mentioned in my previous responses. Learn to prioritise the gifts. All the gifts cannot be on the same level, one has to be of importance, thus carrying weight in your life than the other and you might say I am doing everything, but there are many things I would have done if not because I had to let them go for other things.

For example, I was once into Photoshop which I was doing a lot with. However, when it was time for me to move to the next skill higher than using Photoshop, I did. Because I felt led that I could just let this skill go to allow for another one. At the point of letting it go, I am glad I did as I haven't missed much by dropping Photoshop skill for a greater one, which is animation. So, learn to prioritise. Don't put everything together and begin to chase everything at the same time.

Let me say this, having multiple skill sets, and multiple abilities is not a sin. But you must know which one you need to focus on and the one you need to drop off. I tell people, it is not everything you know how to do that you are meant to pursue as a creative. Learn to know which one is meant to be the main and peripheral as you pursue your skill set. Some people have the skill set for things that God wants to use them for 10 years later.

For example, I have always had interest in children. However, children ministry did not start until three years ago. Despite my long standing, I had to wait till when God gave the go ahead to start the ministry, which is likewise to other creatives who have these number of skill set. Therefore, it is important for us keep that in mind that it is not everything that is meant to be pursued at the same time as some are for the future.

What are the boundaries for young Christians that would help them stay connected to God? Are there biblical convictions that keep you in check that you'd love to share with our readers?

Boundaries... the bible in Joshua 1:8 talks about meditating on God's word, doing what was written, and He will make our way prosperous, by giving us good success. There are no alternatives to it, I, usually, encourage people to make sure they develop themselves in their skillset and craft. But in all, keeping the Word of God closest to the heart is far important.

You know? As much as we always want to rush out and do stuff and execute projects and get things done, we must not ignore the fact that knowing God is what inspires us to do these things. He's the one that keeps us in check because the thing about the "Creative Space Burnout" is a real. The fact that people burn out and in the world, there are things that people use in sustaining the creativity level to keep on firing. Such things might be the source of a power and the likes. So, if your power source is lacking, it will not be long before that person burn out.

However, you might be wondering what is burnout? Well, it is when you are out of creativity, innovation, strength and drive. This happens to every creative and that's why we need not be distracted by work but to always have that time to breathe in not always breathing out all right.



What Christian resources do you draw inspiration from and how do they help to navigate through? You could cite examples as that could be of great help?

Christian resources... They are all on You-Tube. For me, it's Bible messages. I mean, messages from men of God on YouTube. Mensa Otabil, Joshua Selman, Adeboye, Oyedepo and so on. You see, when you listen to these people, maybe when you are about to sleep or when you are washing or whatever, it's a spiritual booster for me. I also do audio Bible a lot.

I try to cover the Bible in a year using audio Bible and it's been fantastic. It's soothing to my body, soul and to my spirit. Therefore, I, strongly, encourage everyone to also take on the habits of audio Bible. It's not every time music, music, music... Sometimes it is also in the direct word of God and also in messages, sermons from the Word of God.

Dide, the soundtrack from the movie, Enoch, is one of your highest-played songs on YouTube music, with over 404k plays and still counting. Could you tell us what inspired the track?

Yeah, the inspiration of the song came from the movie and the story of Adeboye itself. Watching the end credits of that movie gave me a very strong inspiration. I mean the instrumental of the song rather had been done since the edit. The song came at the time when we got to the end of the scene where Adeboye stood up, that was when the inspiration for the Yoruba word "Dide' came about. It was just a soundtrack at first that was used throughout the film. When we were towards the end of the film and we were rounding off the edit, the inspiration for that word "Dide" came, and you know, it was just the same simple word - Dide and the Bible verse of course. Having prayed to see what was most relevant to that aspect, the Bible passage that says "and the spirit of the Lord is upon me to preach the gospel to everyone" came to mind. And of course, it had to be in Yoruba, because there is a kind of power that comes with reciting Bible verses in Yoruba. To this end, it was the story behind the movie, that is, the story of seeing how he was able to arise from all, despite the trials and challenges, that brought about the soundtrack. This is also a call to other children of God across to awake to take our place(s).

Based on your family background, popularity, and all, have you ever felt pressured in a way of not disappointing your parents or the people? If yes, how were you able to manage the pressure and expectations?

The funny thing about this question is that, as children of God, we are not meant to be famous and popular before we do the right thing. What I'm trying to say is, every character, nature, and behavior that I am meant to portray is meant to be what every child of God is meant to portray. So, yes to your question, there might have been the pressure to live up to the expectation and standard that have been set by my parents. However, it is not those standards I am meant to pursue, rather, the standard the Word of God has laid down for us. So, it would be easier, I mean, it would be more basic or straightforward to say, live the life of a child of God. Moreso, yes, my parents' lives gave me so much encouragement and motivation to live for Christ. It was not like I was trying to live for me parents, but to live fir Christ. There are times I live in the consciousness of the name BAMILOYE, but it was like I was living based on that name, rather, on the Word of God. This applies to everyone from christian background to live on the basis of God's word.

What is the one thing you would do differently in your life or career if you had a chance?

What I would have loved to do differently is in the way I associated with people. I have a friendly character which you would notice from how I make friends and associate with people easily. Similarly, I am jovial. Despite the fact that I was only constantly pursuing the Christian race of trying to live up to the expectation of the word of God and the Bible and the Christian profile in general, there were many things I would have done differently, if I were to go back in time. And part of those things were the times that I could say, "oh, as a child of God, I wasn't living up to the expectation." Likewise, of course, you know we can not all have impeccable and flawless records. But if I were to go back in time and I can change anything, I would have loved to have an impeccable and flawless records. A lot stems from the fact that I am a very jovial and friendly person.

So, yes, it has major advantage(s). But from the kind of lifestyle that a lot of people are meant to follow have certain things that are okay, good, fine and seem normal, but from the standard that I'm meant to be, not just as Christians but as leaders in the Christian community, I would definitely have done some things differently, like living more in decorum, if I can use that word. That's back in school and all that.

So, following the theme of the magazine, TESTAMENT, what advice would you give to Christian Creatives out there?

Well, I would tell us now that we are in a new dispensation. The dispensation where the battle has changed. And it is important for us to move with that time. We cannot be stucked with how things have been, rather, we look up to God for the new inspiration on what needs to be done for this present time.

There is always a language for each generation and not everybody taps into that language fast enough to pass

across the message of the gospel. Therefore, it is important for us to excuse "me" to tap into that throne of grace, the word of God and receive divine inspiration for the generation of today, because there's a lot going on and the battle is fierce right now. It has gone so complicated and sophisticated. But I would say that the dispensation we are in is important for us to take God's Word, instructions and presence more seriously than ever before and the Lord will help us in Jesus Name.

THE SHADOW & SPOTLIGHT

n a world obsessed with instant success, it's easy to feel like everyone is racing to be seen. Social media feeds are filled with highlight reels, viral moments, and overnight sensations. The pressure to be noticed, to make it big, and to step into the spotlight is real. But behind every viral post, every successful launch, and every "overnight" success, there are countless hours of preparation, struggle, and sometimes, private battles that never make it to the screen.

For many young creatives, this pursuit of the spotlight can feel like a double-edged sword. The desire to shine is natural, but without a strong foundation built in the shadows, the spotlight can also reveal what we'd rather keep hidden—our insecurities, unhealed wounds, and unchecked weaknesses.

So, how do we navigate this journey without losing ourselves? What does it mean to embrace the shadows before stepping into the light?

We'll take a quick look at Jesus, the perfect example. He was notably highlighted in the Bible as a 12-year-old boy interacting with doctors in the temple, displaying an incredible wealth of wisdom and understanding (Luke 2:41-52). But I find it amusing that the Bible never spoke about

Jesus again until he turned 30. What happened to the other 18 years of his life? If he was already displaying that much wisdom at 12, why wait till 30 to unveil himself publicly to the world? Isn't he the son of God destined to do great things? Why wait?

I may not have perfect answers to these questions, but I believe God is teaching us something here.

THE SHADOW SEASON:

The Bible didn't reveal what happened in the other 18 years of Jesus' life, but I believe those were the preparatory years for his ministry, his shadow season.

As young creatives, ministers, and leaders, it's crucial to understand the value of the shadow season. This period is an ideal time for growth and learning. We often face various personal struggles—lust, anger, greed, pride, arrogance, insecurity, and more. These issues, if not addressed during this hidden season, can become potential disruptors of destiny later on.

As people called by God, we cannot afford to overlook the shadow season, as it is essential for fulfilling our purpose. This is when we discover our gifts, refine our skills, expand our knowledge, and learn from our failures without fear — all away from the pressures of public view.

The shadow season is not without its challenges. During this time, we are being prepared for the significant responsibilities that lie ahead, and it's essential to develop certain qualities to thrive under the spotlight. These trials serve as refining moments, fostering perseverance, discipline, and maturity. They are opportunities to cultivate spiritual gifts and fruits, equipping us for the journey that awaits (James 1:2-4). It's also a crucial period to invest in discipleship, seek out mentorship, embrace accountability, and engage in honest self-reflection.

Jesus, God's only begotten son, went through a shadow season where he grew in wisdom, stature and favour with God and man as written in Luke 2:52. If Jesus didn't skip this season, we shouldn't either.

THE SPOTLIGHT SEASON:

"Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hid. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." [Matthew 5:14, 16 KJV]

Oh, how beautiful it is to be in the spotlight! To be the spectacle of God's glory in a generation like ours is fantastic! Using our influence as creatives in the spotlight is fulfilling to draw others to Christ.

But this beauty is only possible if the foundation has been laid carefully during the shadow season. In a time when many invest more in creating content than in spiritual growth and prayer, it's not uncommon to see people who have bypassed this crucial period and still step into the spotlight. And what does that lead to? Mechanical creatives whose work lacks depth, missing the essence that comes from being in touch with the One whose wisdom is limitless.

With visibility comes greater responsibility and scrutiny. Creatives who skip the shadow season or don't maximise it properly are more likely to experience public moral failures and embarrassment. Which often mocks the Christian faith and drags the name of Jesus in the mud.

The spotlight season brings its own set of challenges—burnout, fame, and adulation, the crushing weight of expectations, struggles with humility, the fear of being cancelled, and the pressure of biased opinions and assumptions. Yet, these trials are easier to navigate when there is a constant, seamless connection with the One who sent you. Trusting that He who placed you in the spotlight will not abandon you while you are there makes all the difference.

Dear Creatives, the goal of this article isn't to make you obsessed with the two seasons mentioned but to make you attentive to the direction of God's will for your life, just like Jesus was. Though the "shadow season" may feel like obscurity, it is a critical time of growth. It is easy to be inspired by the lives of ministers like Nathaniel Bassey and Dunsin Oyekan, but I can assure you that they both went through their shadow seasons.

Irrespective of your current season or stage in life, know that there might be times when you will repeat seasons — maybe for a new assignment or another direction in God's will for your life. So embrace the experience again, deal with the inner struggles, and trust God's timing for the glory.

We are all called to spread the Gospel to all the corners of the earth, which somehow puts us in the spotlights in the shadows. I pray that God gives us the grace to maximise the shadow season and the endless desire to reveal Jesus when the spotlight is on us.



ife is a continuum! A Continuum in life is an ongoing process decorated with experiences, gradual change, and development. These experiences shaped the behaviour and mindset of the people in that era and characterized their value in life. In this continuum, generations are born with variant ideas, beliefs, and value systems. These general value systems have percolated the Christian space alongside societal beliefs. Popular among these generations is one called "GenZ."

You might wonder how the name came about, but there is no naming convention for generations. Famous names and nicknames acquired randomly during their sojourn metamorphose into a name for the generation, and so far, we have had Boomers - born between 1946 and 1965 and got their name from the boom of the world wars. GenX - people born between 1965 to 1980. Millennials are

the next generation after Gen X, Gen Y, or iGen, born between 1981 and 1995. The next generation is GenZ, born between 1996 and 2015—lastly, the Gen Alphas are children born in the current generation.

Lately, there have been concerns concerning the Christian practices of the GenZs compared to those of our fathers. These concerns are characterized by their curiosity, love for information, and need for authenticity. This generation is marked by questioning the status quo and seeking answers - Why? Growing up in this digital age, with instant access to information, GenZs have embraced diversity, craving transparency and genuine connection in an ever-changing world. They have drifted towards a deeper understanding and explanation of faith - Why do we believe? In sincere seeking, they have questioned the status of religion and Christianity.

GenZs have broken down barriers and pushed boundaries to reach a wider audience. They have

redefined how we share the Gospel driving a more authentic, inclusive, and technologically savvy approach to ministry and ministering. In all of this, there still seems to be a gap and a sharp shift in the value system held by these generations. The gap is better visualised in the area of lack of in-depth knowledge, lack of experience, and lack of a relationship with God. This gap has been made visible by the prevalence of contextualised arguments and discussions on social media and popular onair platforms, especially podcasts and comment sections that focus on biblical standpoints and doctrinal matters. Another gap can be seen in the daily life of the GenZs when contrasted with the life expected of a believer.

Though crude and unlearned like the fishermen-disciples of Christ, our fathers held the gospel with so much value that it characterised their everyday life. They spent long hours in Bible study, juxtaposing scriptures with scriptures, and finished with extra prayers seeking God's face. They had no platform to seek visibility, but they lived their lives and were known and defended by some unbelievers when wrongly accused. They were not in a hurry to take over the stage like Absalom until the time was right.

By comparing these two generations, you see a subtle erosion in values. One seeks to be known, while the other seeks to know. Apostle Paul made it clear which generation he belonged to when he prayed "that I may know Him and the power of His resurrection," many years after walking in power and dominion. He walked in the footsteps of the great Biblical leader, Moses, who came to the knowledge that there is more to know about God other than the burning bush and pillar of cloud.

Our fathers and mothers had something with God that made their results different from ours. Men like Joseph Ayo Babalola walked in the office of the miraculous throughout his earthly sojourn. His life produced more results that have laid the foundation for many Christians today. Arch Bishop Benson Idahosa's prayer group metamorphosed into the present-day Church of God Missions. Stories of his daring faith still linger around the Christian space: famous among them is his command to stop the convention of witches on Nigerian soil. It's clear evidence that he took Jesus' words in Matthew 21:21 by the horns. The influence of his faith life can be seen in the ministry of his spiritual son, Bishop David Oyedepo.

Other than the miraculous, our fathers gave themselves to evangelism and the study of the word. Reinhard Bonnke moved to South Africa after his conversion and spent his life to further the gospel of salvation on African soil. Bonnke attracted millions of souls to the lord in his "Great Gospel Crusade." Despite being called and anointed, he kept his messages simple and easy to understand, bearing in mind his audience's literacy level. His ministry made impacts from a local scene to a global stage.

The women were not left out in this wave of God. Maria Woodworth Etter etched her name in the sands of time like the biblical Jael and Deborah. Etter never looked down on her gender or age. She began seeking after God from a young age and downloaded a deposit of God, so much so that powerful preachings and divine manifestations characterised her ministry.


Our generation needs to wake up, stand up and stand out. We need to uphold the banner of Christ and create a clear distinction between light and darkness. We must go back to the basics of the Bible and, like the children of Israel, be willing to do all that we have been commanded therein. It is only through obedience and a deep sense of reverence for God that we can attract the results that we seek.

What the devil sought through haughtiness, Jesus Christ got through humility. Seeking visibility through social media, engaging in verbal vetting of messages of other ministers, and having a form of godliness without true power will only lead to perdition and a chaotic Christian journey. Paul understood the place of diligence and study, which warranted his admonishment in 1 Timothy chapter 4 verse 17: "Till I come, give attendance to reading, to exhortation, to doctrine." Integrity should not only be spoken about but should be practiced.

A famous songwriter says, "Practise what you preach... What you do, not what you say, will stand on judgement day." GenZ believers should practice true Christianity in their workplaces, busi-

nesses, and homes. They should submit to leaders and learn from them. In his epistle to Titus, Paul told the older women to teach the younger women sobriety and love.

We might be called GenZ, but we're no different from our fathers if we follow the path that pleases our creator. In the book of Deuteronomy chapter 5, verses 2 and 3. Moses told the Israelites that the covenant of God is with the present generation and not the previous generation who passed in the wilderness; it therefore behoves us as a generation to rise and do the needful. We can follow in the footsteps of John Wycliffe, who stood against unbiblical practices, dedicated himself to evangelism and Bible translation, and be bold in our witness for Christ. Like John Knox, who prayed, "O give me Scotland, or I die," we can be passionate and dedicated to seeing our nations transformed for God. Let us pray for a similar move of God in our time so that we may experience revival, evangelism, and transformation.













The Bible says, "God directs the steps of the godly". In every phase of life you are (church directly or professional), the important question is: Are you using that position to spread the gospel of love? And is Christ evident in your daily life and tasks? My life has always followed the mantra of Psalms 16:6, which says, "Lines are fallen unto me in pleasant places", and when I discovered my gift of writing and the calling to create visual content much later, I knew there was a big picture God was preparing me to fit in. You may be reading this and can reflect on how you thought you liked to write and that that was your calling, but a few months later, you were led to start a podcast, and things are now more confusing than before. So, what, then, is your purpose? Better put, what is God's purpose for you?

"Purpose" is what you do that makes God glorified. Your life is the first content, even before the content you create. Here are Biblical and Contemporary proofs both in ancient and recent times:

MOSES was a shepherd by career. His staff/mantle was the tool God used to part the Red Sea and perform many signs and wonders. His purpose for that calling was to lead the children of Israel to the promised land and get them there safely.

ABOLAJI ADEOLA is the Lead Pastor of RCCG Living Seed Church. Beyond the fact that he is a certified Google digital marketing expert and a Certified Project Management Professional, he is currently the Head of Digital Communications in the Office of the Principal Executive Assistant to the General Overseer and has used this tool to project God's purpose for his life - reaching out to nations through the gospel.

PAUL, a Lawyer by profession/career, used tent-making, oratory gifts, and writing skills to achieve God's purpose for him to evangelize the Gentile world.

JOSEPH was a household superintendent both for Potiphar and eventually for Pharoah. That could be said to be his career because he found himself doing it at different levels and did it well. Meanwhile, God gave him the gifts of dream interpretations and leadership skills to achieve his purpose for being in that career. Consequently, he saved up enough grains for the period of famine in Egypt, thereby saving the Egyptians, his family, and surrounding nations through the famine.

DANIEL was a Jewish scholar and master interpreter of dreams. He used his wisdom and gift of visions and interpretation of dreams to save lives, serve Babylonian kings, and fulfil God's purpose for sending Him to Babylon.

Who then is a Christian CREATIVE


Christian Creatives are God's PROs (Public Relations Officers) on earth. They act in various capacities like Literature Evangelists, Visual Content Creators including (but not limited to) YouTubers, Filmmakers, TikTokers, Audio Content Creators including songwriters, song cover makers, podcasters, etc. The list is endless. The importance of storytelling and record keeping can be seen in the case of the Bible events and happenings that were recorded and handed down through generations. Christians today can easily read and apprehend God's promises, admonitions, and commandments through the Bible. It is also worthy of note that New Testament pillars penned scriptural truths that align with the prophecies spoken about in the Old Testament.





The testament of Christ's birth in the four gospels aligns with the prophecies made by Prophets Isaiah and Jeremiah. Christian Creatives should desist from all forms of heresy and negative contents that divide the body of Christ and do not edify the bride of Christ. While we have established that your calling can be independent of your career, acquiring relevant skills to better your calling is also important. Putting the work where necessary is not enough to have a calling. 2 Samuel 24:24 emphasizes that "you cannot give to God what does not cost you something". Take your calling, talents, and gifts to another level. For a creative who is called into content writing and creation, taking up courses in copywriting, script writing, effective podcasting, etc, will be an added advantage. Know how to influence and maximize social media algorithms for efficiently propagating your content to its target audience.

Furthermore, while it is necessary to pursue excellence, start where you are. The most frequent excuse these days is "There are too many people doing that already", but the Bible says the harvest is plenty and the labourers are few. So, who are you to say there are enough labourers already? (Matthew 9:37-38).



he need for **kingdom financiers** cannot be overemphasized. The gospel media ministry is a money-sapping ministry. The edge the entertainment industry has is the ability to apply for sponsorships and partnerships with brands, investors, etc, but rarely do we have the church to support this ministry. We need children of God to rise up and donate funds for literature evangelism, gospel film shows, outreaches, making of gospel movies, etc. Hence, they need to be professionally useful and relevant.

In conclusion, there is no feat without a challenge, and while I may not outline them here, we know that we are overcomers in Christ. In times of confusion, receive clarity from the Scriptures and counsel from those ahead.

s an entrepreneur, the gospel in the marketplace is as important as channelling your calling wherever you are. You can showcase God through your business. What confuses people is that they believe and think that preaching must be done from the pulpit or even through created contents; they tend to forget that as Christians, it is paramount that others see Jesus in your everyday life, irrespective of where you find yourself, as a politician or as an accountant. You are the Bible that men will read.

To fulfil the gospel of reconciliation given to us all, whether as a creative or not, you are a creation that should glorify your Creator. Needless to say, wealth will attract sinners to the gospel. You can serve God with wealth, so we must be found as Christians in the marketplace, making policies that will favour the propagation of the gospel.

It is also important to reiterate that as a media evangelist, there are divisions to ministry, and even as 'small' as sharing godly content is recognizable in the Bible just as we have, Paul planted, Apollos watered; great were the number of them called. God needs the company of many to reach others, as we have in Psalm 68:11. Be a Barnabas and win them one by one - Daniel 12:3.

It sounds very funny. Right? While doing all these, I was keen on encouraging myself in whichever way I could. I ended up asking people around me to visit my website and whenever they told me they were too busy, I helped them visit the website dropping a comment by myself. What determination!

Another amusing thing was that I woke up the next day seeing comments I had left by myself and for myself, and guess what I did. I wouldn't stop smiling, telling myself "At least, people are visiting my website". Tell me who the people are if not me?

I kept at that for months and slowly stopped since I became active on Facebook, and was gradually growing an audience around what I write.

One would have thought I would stay glued to a free website but thanks to my elder brother who noticed my passion and introduced me to a friend. Before then, I sat down to think through what the name of my website would be. It never occurred to me to use my name at all but a casual conversation with a friend turned the light bulb on. Since I initially go by the pen name "dreamer", I thought to myself "When will I ever stop dreaming and start achieving?"

That birthed the name "Daachiever".

Thanks to my brother's friend. He was highly instrumental in my dream coming true by holding my hands every step of the way. Thankfully, he hosted my website for free. I could remember the evening of the day that changed my life. I was short of cash, but I can't remember the specifics. I believe he must have borrowed me the money to pay for the domain but I remembered having little or less on me. With joy, I returned home and there the journey began. Beginning at my third year in the university, I actively started sharing my content on Facebook, and somehow I had a burden to allow Christian writers to publish their content or stories on my website which is basically called "Guest Blogging". I had a few conversations with people and they told me the cost of maintaining a website was huge. Since I had one, I thought to myself, "Why not create room for others?" Besides, I wasn't going to lose in any way.

God was definitely in my story because He allowed my path to cross with a junior secondary school classmate while in the university and in our conversation, I told him about the website and my need to create a space for writers to share their content. He loved the idea, and we exchanged contacts. That same person is currently the co-founder. So amazing. Over the years, the vision has been refined. From guest blogging, I moved to interviewing Christian authors about their books. All these happened while I was still in school. Little by little, I wondered what God has in store for me. Surely, it would be the best because I had just scratching the surface.

2020, the year COVID-19 struck globally, marked the most defining stage of my journey. I needed to fully define what I was doing with the website which I named "Daachiever Blog" then. After a series of activities like fasting and praying with medications, I wrote out an abridged version of my plans for the website as God laid on my heart. It dawned on me to move from calling it "Daachiever Blog" to "Daachiever Incorporation", a name I got from copying a friend's brand at the time. Though I wasn't satisfied with the name, I let it be. It was a start I needed. I knew I would get to a point where I would find a name I loved.

After a series of trials and errors, unsure of what I was doing most of the time, I kept going. I decided that if I was going to successfully run a blog-based organization, I needed to register the name. That was when the change of name started. At the point of registration, we transitioned from "Incorporation" to "International" and I really love the name. It has been a year of evolving. We have launched projects like the Daachiever Magazine, now called **Evidence Magazine** (which you now read). We have held end-of-year contest for creatives, giving out in the little way we can; and now, we have launched another initiative called "Christian Creatives Collective" with several arms under it.

One could easily say, "a little one is becoming a thousand". Really, if I look back, I'm not sure when the change started to do something big. I just simply had the heart to bring people in. Why? It was because of what I had back then. The access I had to a website, many didn't. It must be my "super power" then (lol).





It is so exciting what a little walk of faith with God ends in. Definitely, it wasn't easy. I had my share of great doubt. In fact, I still do, but I'm glad each day comes with an opportunity never to give up; to pursue that silent nudge in my heart, and yield my desires to God in every step of the way, because surely He is going to hold my hands.

This year, we fully launched the "Tent Revival for Christian Creatives" initiative and we are even holding our first event. Believe me, if you had told me about this in 2019, I would have laughed out loud. Oh, I also have to say, while I wanted to give writers the opportunity to write on the website then, I was looking at making money from the traffic that comes. I didn't make that money, though. This God!






